THE STORY IN BRIEF

Set in the Cornish fishing village of Reddering, Act 1 opens with **Dame Hannah** narrating to a chorus of professional bridesmaids the legend of the bad Baronets of Ruddigore - doomed by a witch's curse to commit at least one crime each day, or suffer an agonising death.

Upon this scene enters Rose Maybud, an attractive damsel who has not yet found a husband. She is drawn to Robin Oakapple, a young farmer, but manners and modesty prevent her from making this apparent. Robin secretly returns her regard, but is too bashful to declare his passion.

We learn that Robin is really Sir Ruthven Murgatroyd, Baronet of Ruddigore, who has fled from the title and the curse, leaving both to be borne by his young brother Despard. Robin's true identity is known only to his faithful retainer, Adam, and his foster brother, Richard Dauntless.

Richard, a sailor returning from the sea, volunteers to resolve the deadlock between the young lovers, but upon meeting Rose falls in love with her himself, proposes and is accepted. However, Rose then learns of Robin's love for her, and transfers her affection to one who is clearly a better prospect.

Mad Margaret enters. She has been in love with Despard, the present bad Baronet. Interrupting the chorus, Despard tells of his infamous deeds, but points out also his attempts to atone for them. Richard, driven by the dictates of his heart, reveals to Despard Robin's true identity,

and the wedding of Robin and Rose is rudely interrupted. Sir Despard, now a virtuous person, declares that he will be true to Mad Margaret, despite Rose's offer to wed him. She then, not at all abashed, falls back upon Richard.

A ct 2 takes place in the picture gallery of Ruddigore Castle, with the portraits of his ancestors looking grimly down upon a sadly changed Robin.

After reluctantly giving his consent to the marriage of Rose and Richard, Robin makes an impassioned plea to his ancestors to help him. Led by his Uncle Roderick, they step down from their picture frames, accusing him of evading the terms of the curse and order him to carry off a maiden. After suffering a sample of the agonies they can inflict, Robin agrees, and sends Adam to bring him a maiden.

A reformed Despard and Margaret now appear, to beg Robin to forswear his wicked ways. He declares that he will do so, when Adam enters with his abducted maiden - the redoubtable Dame Hannah. She proves so capable of protecting herself that Robin calls upon Roderick for help, resulting in the sentimental reunion of a pair of past lovers.

Robin interrupts their reverie with the solution to the problem. Since refusal to commit a crime is tantamount to suicide, which is in itself a crime, the curse is inoperative. Sir Roderick must therefore still be alive and Rose marries a reformed Robin amid general rejoicing.

BRIEF HISTORY OF RUDDIGORE

"What is the title of your new opera, Mr. Gilbert?"

"'Ruddygore' - or not as good as 'The Mikado'." replied Gilbert.

Shortly after the first night, an acquaintance asked Gilbert:

"How is Bloodygore going on?"

"It is not Bloodygore, it is Ruddygore!"

"Oh! Well, that's the same thing!"

"Is it?" said Gilbert. "I suppose then you will think that if I say I admire your ruddy countenance, it's the same as if I said I like your bloody cheek! Well it isn't - and I don't!"

In January 1887, the enormously successful run of *THE MIKADO* was terminated to make way for the performance of a new Gilbert & Sullivan production *RUDDYGORE* - a parady of Victorian blood-and-thunder melodrama.

Public anticipation of another tremendous success was high, and on January 22, 1887, the Savoy Theatre was packed with celebrities. After the performance, the reaction was divided between two extremes - part of the audience cheered and the others hissed and shouted "give us back *The Mikado*".

The newspapers added to the enthusiasm by objecting to the title. To Gilbert "Ruddygore" was simply red blood, but several critics considered that, although it would do well enough for men, "it would scarcely sound pretty on women's lips". Within eleven days Gilbert had changed the 'y' to 'i'.

A further complication developed when the correspondent of the Paris *Figaro* accused Gilbert of having insulted France and the French Navy, and this accusation mounted to Ambassadorial level. This necessitated an attempt to explain the British sense of humour (in French!) to quell the tempest.

Despite this stormy beginning, RUDDIGORE ran for 288 performances, causing Gilbert to remark, "I could do with a few more such failures!". It contains many memorable items, such as Richard's "Parly-vous" song, Roderick's "The Ghost's High Noon" and the brilliant "matter" trio of the second act, and is a well-established and popular representative of the Gilbert & Sullivan range.



GRAHAM FORD

Director

After experiences with various musical comedy companies, Graham joined the National Theatre Opera School, playing a number of lead baritone parts. He has played lead roles in KISMET, PAINT YOUR WAGON, KISS ME KATE, and several G & S operettas, as well as a number of roles with the semi-professional company, Globe Opera.

A Sun Aria semi-finalist, Graham has won the musical comedy and vocal championship at South Street, and appeared on Quest 77 on Channel 2.

He teaches singing locally, and directed TRIAL BY JURY in 1985 and has since played the Bosun in PINAFORE and Pish Tush in THE MIKADO.

DIANNE RICHTER

Producer

From Assistant Producer for THE MIKADO, Dianne has been promoted to Producer for RUDDIGORE, as well as understudying Dame Hannah.

Dianne is currnetly the secretary of Diamond Valley Singers, and has sung solos in *THE MES-SIAH* for the last three years. A singing student of Graham Ford's, she has sung in numerous eisteddfods, and regularly takes part in daytime concerts at elderly citizens' centres.

Dianne has also performed in a musical review with *Elwood Theatre Company* and played the female lead in a gospel musical at Ormond Uniting Church.



RHONDA WEBB

Choreographer

Rhonda is presently Head of the Expressive Arts Faculty at Loyola College, Watsonia, teaching Dance and has been associated with Greensborough/Janelle Calisthenics College since 1976. She has vast experience in the field of calisthenics, tap and ballet dancing and aerobics.

Rhonda's choreography experience includes: the Combined Schools' Choir performances in Darwin (which was filmed by the ABC) in 1981/82; folk and modern dance items for the North Australian Eisteddford; school productions; and Education Department (Northern Territory and Victoria) promotional displays.

Rhonda was the Valley Musical Society's choreographer for last year's production of THE MIKADO.



DIAMOND VALLEY SINGERS

In 1985 Ian Lowe rang the Fords and asked them to help with a performance of TRIAL BY JURY with the Eltham Orchestra. Rehearsals started and the Valley Musical Society was born.

There were two performances of *TRIAL BY JURY* with other items by the orchestra, and \$1300 was raised for **World Vision**. Because of the nature of the cause, rehearsal venues were, and still are, provided free of charge by the Diamond Creek and Greensborough Uniting Churches.

Since this start, the Society has performed three seasons of Handel's MES-SIAH, two more Gilbert and Sullivans (HMS PINAFORE and THE MIKADO), and some smaller works including assisting at the Diamond Valley and Eltham Carols By Candlelight.

Proceeds continue to be donated to World Vision each year, and to date total over \$6,000.

Considerable work has been done this year, preparing a Constitution and applying for Incorporation. As part of this process, a special meeting was held and the name of the Society changed to the **Diamond Valley Singers**, to more closely associate the group with the local area.

They have already been invited to perform at both Greensborough and Eltham Festivals later in the year.

At one of the first MIKADO rehearsals, a new chorus member, Rhonda Webb, asked if the group required a choreographer, a position they were currently trying to fill. Though often having cause to regret her moment of enthusiasm, it has been regretted more by some members of the male chorus on mornings following rehearsals. Audiences, however, have been most enthusiastic with the results.

With this support from members of the company, none of whom are paid, the Society hopes to continue to raise money for charity and provide opportunities for local singers. New members are welcome, and if interested, interested parties should fill out the insert included in the program or call **Graham Ford** on **438 1957**.

THE ELTHAM COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA

The orchestra has been in existence for about twelve years. During that time the orchestra has performed three or four different programs each year. These programs have included symphonies, concertos (some with Ian as piano soloist), musical comedy selections and other lighter works. The Eltham Community Orchestra has contributed to both Eltham and Greensborough festivals.

In recent years, the Eltham Community Orchestra has co-operated with the Valley Musical Society (now the Diamond Valley Singers) in performances of Handel's MESSIAH, and in performances of Gilbert and Sullivan's TRIAL BY JURY, HMS PINAFORE and THE MIKADO. They look forward to this association continuing.
