

THE STORY IN BRIEF

ACT I AN ARCADIAN LANDSCAPE, between 1700 and 1882

Twenty years before the opening scene Iolanthe had married a mortal. Fairies, led by Celia, Leila and Fleta are now lamenting that their Queen has banished Iolanthe and are begging the Fairy Queen to pardon her. Iolanthe rises from the stream where she has dwelt and is forgiven. She had lived in the stream to be near her son Strephon, a shepherd, born after she left his father, who is unaware of his son's existence. Strephon, who is half fairy and half human, is in love with Phyllis, a shepherdess and a Ward in Chancery. The Lord Chancellor will not consent to their marriage.

Phyllis, to whom many peers are attentive, has decided to marry Strephon before she is of age. A procession of Peers, followed by the Lord Chancellor, enters. They want him to allow her to marry one of them. The Earls of Tolloller and Mountararat declare their love, but Phyllis says her heart belongs to Strephon. The Lord Chancellor will not relent, but Iolanthe encourages her son. She will lay his case before the Fairy Queen: for Strephon is in the strange position of being, as a fairy down to the waist, able to defy humans so far, whilst being a mortal as to his lower half, he can be captured and imprisoned.

The peers by misinterpreting remarks made "aside" by Strephon and Iolanthe, persuade Phyllis to think Strephon false to her. She promises to marry one of the peers. Strephon, distracted, calls on the fairies to help. The Queen decides that he shall go into Parliament, and by his fairy powers ruin their political schemes.

ACT II PALACE YARD, WESTMINSTER

The fairies' plot is successful; Strephon in Parliament is irresistible. The peers beg the fairies to stop him but they cannot.

Phyllis is engaged to two indecisive earls. When she learns that Strephon is half a fairy she is still determined to marry him. It turns out that the Lord Chancellor is the mortal whom Iolanthe married; but he believed she died childless and she is bound, under penalty of death, not to tell him the truth. The fairy pleads for her son and learns, to her horror, that the Lord Chancellor himself plans to marry Phyllis. The only solution is for Iolanthe to reveal herself to him as his wife even though she may lose her life. The other fairies save her by confessing that they have married the Peers. Unable to condemn them all the Queen relents and decides to marry the sentry, first turning him into a fairy, and then transforming all the Peers. They all leave for fairyland.

JENNI WILLIAMS


Phyllis




ROSEMARY CHAPPLE

DIAMOND VALLEY SINGERS

In 1985 Ian Lowe approached Graham and Mavis Ford for help in staging TRIAL BY JURY with the Eltham Community Orchestra in aid of World Vision. Rehearsals began, and "The Valley Musical Society" (later to become "The Diamond Valley Singers") was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public and to raise money for charity. So far, \$16,700 has been donated to World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, the Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service and Harrison Youth Services.

Two successful performances of TRIAL BY JURY raised \$1300 for World Vision. Since then, singers and orchestra have combioned in six more Gilbert and Sullivan productions (HMS PINAFORE, THE MIKADO, RUDDIGORE, THE PIRATES OF PENZANCE, PRINCESS IDA and THE GONDOLIERS), as well as in Handel's MESSIAH and Haydn's THE SEASONS. The Singers have also performed smaller works, including Maunder's OLIVET TO CALVARY, have taken part in local Carols by Candlelight services and sung in the massed choir at Carols by Candlelight at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl on Christmas Eve.

DIAMOND VALLEY AND ELTHAM COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA

This orchestra has been in existence for about seventeen years, and performs three or four programmes annually. These have involved symphonies, concertos (some with Ian Lowe as piano soloist), musical comedy and other lighter works. Teaching is incorporated into the program for each year, with separate wind and string sessions, as well as rehearsing for public performance. The Orchestra is a resource for classical-type musicians and for local endeavours such as festivals and art shows and for other performing groups. COMMUNITY AID ABROAD

Community Aid Abroad is an Australian non-government overseas aid organisation that supports about 200 self-help projects in 23 countries overseas and in Aboriginal Australia. The aim is not only to improve the living conditions of people but also to support the poorest of the poor in their struggle to overcome poverty and injustice.

Strengthening people's organisations is an important step in making sure that socio-economic improvements really benefit the poor. For instance, a village irrigation may only benefit the wealthy landowners unless the poorer villagers have the power to determine where it goes and who gets the water.

CAA funds projects that are initiated and carried out by the people who directly benefit from them. We believe people are motivated towards change when they control that change. The range of projects is broad; it includes health, training, production, education, employment, agricultural, literacy anf motivational projects. Some are integrated community development projects encompassing many of these areas. Some focus specifically on the position of women. Care is taken to ensure that projects are in harmony with the local environment and culture.

Raising awareness about issues of poverty and injustice amongst Australians is also a priority, and Community Aid Abroad is active in campaigns such as Third World Debt and Aboriginal Issues.

ELTHAM EMERGENCY RELIEF SERVICE

The Eltham Emergency Relief Service is one of the programs which operates from the Eltham Community Health Centre in Dudley St, Eltham. The service provides assistance with emergency housing, crisis counselling, financial counselling, advocacy, cash cheques, cheques to Safeway and food parcels donated by the Warrandyte Food Bank, Eltham FoodShare and the Christian Outreach Centre. Trained staff from both the Eltham Shire and the Victorian Department of Health are employed at the Centre and provide respectful and relevant help.

The Emergency Relief funds are currently obtained through the Federal Government (approx \$12 000 pa) and the Magistrates Courts (Heidelberg Court \$25 000 pa). As about 1000 people were given financial help in 1991, it can be seen that only about \$30 is available on average. In many cases it is an entire family for which this amount is given. Whilst other services are important, it is frequently the immediate financial relief which is essential.

The present economic climate is forcing people who have never had to ask for help to now do so and the demand for Emergency Relief is increasing.

We greatly appreciate the support by the Diamond Valley Singers and the Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra. All money raised will go directly to people who need it.
