The Story

The happy ending is one of the most persistent conventions of light opera. The audience always knows that it can expect that the problems of the characters and the complications of the story will be resolved, however implausibly, in the closing scene, and that every couple will be united amid general rejoicing. The Yeomen of the Guard is an exception to this rule.

The time is the sixteenth century; the place, Tower Green. Colonel Fairfax, handsome and brave, is under sentence of death, falsely charged with sorcery by a powerful relative who will inherit the Fairfax estate if the Colonel dies unmarried. An expected reprieve has failed to arrive and Sergeant Meryll, who owes his life to Fairfax, makes a plan to save him. Meryll's son, Leonard, is joining the Yeomen of the Guard; he will go into hiding and Fairfax, shaved and dressed as a Yeoman, and will take Leonard's place. Phoebe, Meryll's daughter, is in love with the Colonel, and readily agrees to steal the keys of the dungeon from her admirer, the slow-witted Head jailer and assistant tormentor, Wilfred Shadbolt. The Colonel, meanwhile, prepares to face death with exemplary courage. He asks the Lieutenant to find a girl who will marry him for a consideration so that his evil relative's intentions can be thwarted. Two strolling players, Jack Point and Elsie Maynard, now arrive, and the Lieutenant is just in time to save them from an aggressively ill-behaved crowd. Elsie, badly needing money to buy medicine for her sick mother, agrees to the marriage plan. Jack Point, who hopes to marry Elsie himself, also agrees when he is convinced that the new bride will become a widow an hour after the ceremony has taken place. Elsie is blindfolded and led away to be married, while the Lieutenant engages Point as his household jester. Phoebe steals the keys from the lovesick Wilfred, the Colonel is released, disguised as a Yeoman and welcomed by the Guard. In the finale of Act 1, all is ready for the execution when it is discovered that the prisoner is missing. Wilfred is in disgrace, Jack Point is in despair, and Elsie faints in Fairfax's arms as the curtain falls.

Two days later, the Yeomen have failed to recapture the prisoner, and the formidable Dame Carruthers leads a chorus of women in deriding them for their incompetence. The Dame then reveals that Elsie, whom she has been nursing, has talked of the marriage in her sleep. Fairfax, still as Leonard, is pleased to find that he has married the attractive Elsie. Jack Point now devises a scheme to save Elsie from the marriage. He persuades Wilfred, in return for some lessons in jesting, to fire a shot and pretend that the two of them have pursued Fairfax and shot him through the head as he tried to swim the river. The story is believed, and for the moment Wilfred is a hero. Point now proposes to Elsie, but Fairfax-Leonard offers to give him a lesson in wooing and wins Elsie for himself. Point is in despair again, and Phoebe, who is distraught, inadvertently lets out the secret of Fairfax's disguise to Wilfred. Realising what she has done, she buys his silence by agreeing to marry him, and Dame Carruthers, who has overheard, seizes her chance to force Meryll (whom she has long had designs upon) to take her to the altar.

The Story cont.

In the final scene, Elsie is about to marry the man she believes is Leonard, when the Lieutenant brings news that Fairfax is alive and reprieved, and coming to claim his bride. Elsie feels again that she is doomed to be the wife of a man she has never seen; but she soon recognises her husband as "Leonard". The couple's happiness is acclaimed by all on stage; but in this opera someone is painfully and poignantly excluded from the rejoicing. Point enters, and as the opera ends, "falls senseless at their feet".

DIAMOND VALLEY SINGERS

In 1985 Ian Lowe approached Graham and Mavis Ford for help in staging TRIAL BY JURY with the Eltham Community Orchestra in aid of World Vision. Rehearsals began, and "The Valley Musical Society" (later to become "The Diamond Valley Singers") was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public and to raise money for charity. So far, \$25,700 has been donated to World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, the Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services and the Eltham Emergency Relief fund.

Two successful performances of TRIAL BY JURY raised \$1300 for World Vision. Since then, singers and orchestra have combined in more Gilbert and Sullivan productions (HMS PINAFORE, THE MIKADO, RUDDIGORE, THE PIRATES OF PENZANCE, PRINCESS IDA, THE GONDOLIERS and IOLANTHE), as well as in Handel's MESSIAH and Haydn's THE SEASONS. The Singers have also performed smaller works, including Maunder's OLIVET TO CALVARY, have taken part in local Carols by Candlelight services and sung in the massed choir at Carols by Candlelight at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl on Christmas Eve.

DIAMOND VALLEY AND ELTHAM COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA

This orchestra has been in existence for about eighteen years, and performs three or four programmes annually. These have involved symphonies, concertos (some with lan Lowe as piano soloist), musical comedy and other lighter works. Teaching is incorporated into the program for each year, with separate wind and string sessions, as well as rehearsing for public performance. The Orchestra is a resource for classical-type musicians and for local endeavours such as festivals and art shows and for other performing groups. The Orchestra looks forward to tackling ambitious works and to continuing its enjoyable and productive association with the Diamond Valley Singers.

COMMUNITY AID ABROAD

Community Aid Abroad is an Australian non-government overseas aid organisation that supports about 200 self-help projects in 23 countries overseas and in Aboriginal Australia. The aim is not only to improve the living conditions of people but also to support the poorest of the poor in their struggle to overcome poverty and injustice.

Strengthening people's organisations is an important step in making sure that socio-economic improvements really benefit the poor. For instance, a village irrigation may only benefit the wealthy landowners unlesss the poorer villagers have the power to determine where it goes and who gets the water.

CAA funds projects that are initiated and carried out by the people who directly benefit from them. We believe people are motivated towards change when they control that change. The range of projects is broad; it includes health, training, production, education, employment, agricultural, literacy and motivational projects. Some are integrated community development projects encompassing many of these areas. Some focus specifically on the position of women. Care is taken to ensure that projects are in harmony with the local environment and culture.

Raising awareness about issues of poverty and injustice amongst Australians is also a priority, and CAA is active in campaigns such as Third World Debt and Aboriginal Issues.

ELTHAM EMERGENCY RELIEF SERVICE

The Eltham Emergency Relief Service is one of the programs which operates from the Eltham Community Health Centre in Dudley St, Eltham. The service provides assistance with emergency housing, crisis counselling, financial counselling, advocacy, cash cheques, cheques to Safeway and food parcels donated by the Warrandyte Food Bank, Eltham FoodShare and the Christian Outreach Centre. Trained staff from both the Eltham Shire and the Victorian Department of Health are employed at the Centre and provide respectful and relevant help. Demand for help is continually increasing and exceeds the resources available so that appointments can be given to about only about two-thirds of applicants. This was about 1000 people and families last year.

The Emergency Relief funds have been mainly obtained through the Federal Government (approx \$17 000 last year) and the Magistrates Courts (Heidelberg Court \$25 000 last year). However, the Court funds have dramatically reduced to about \$500 a month. We therefore greatly appreciate this effort by the Diamond Valley Singers and the Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra. All money raised will go directly to people who need it.

To cope with the problems of demand and lack of resources the Relief Service is now starting a volunteer program. In this program volunteers will be given professional training and professional work. It is hoped that the scheme will appeal to people pursuing professional social-work type courses and they will feel that the work will benefit them in this type of career.
