COMMUNITY and VOLUNTEERS of ELTHAM INC.

COMMUNITY and VOLUNTEERS of ELTHAM (C.A.V.E.) started fifteen years ago, as a group of residents seeking to help Eltham people in need with transport, gardening, food parcels, etc. Responding to urgent and obvious need, the group turned to providing short-term accommodation to families in crisis.

Today, C.A.V.E. has six houses in Eltham and Greensborough and 1.6 housing workers and about 45 parents and children in residence at any one time.

C.A.V.E. families move on as soon as they are settled enough to do so, and permanent accommodation can be found, usually about three months after they arrive. It is C.A.V.E.'s boast that virtually all of their families are helped to settle in suitable accommodation, where they can manage the rent, and so get off the dreadful homeless treadmill.

C.A.V.E. is one of the very few emergency housing agencies in Melbourne offering houses to families and perhaps alone in its persistence in settling its families safely in permanent accommodation.



The Story...

Welcome to our S.N.A.P (Sensitive New Age Production) of Patience. It was with some trepidation that we decided to update this production. We hope that you will find, as we did, that Gilbert and Sullivan's story of pretence and growth into love fits neatly into the 1990's.

Act I opens in the food court of the local shopping centre. It is that magic time just before all of the lights are on and all of the shops are open. The women who shop here have been overwhelmed by the "Sensitive New Age Guy" Bunthorne. He has convinced them that he is truly sensitive and caring. On the strength of this they have abandoned their fiances in the Army Reserve. and follow Bunthorne around listening attentively to his truly awful poetry, and hoping that he will chose one of them to be his.

Unfortunately, he has set his heart on Patience, who owns the TOWER DELI. Patience has been busy building her business and has neglected her emotional life. She is completely uninterested in Bunthorne.

The Army Reserve arrive to see the women, only to find them devotedly intent on Bunthorne. They are far from amused. Patience is moved to wonder about the power of life, and determines to fall in love as soon as possible. Unfortunately her concept of love is dreadfully misinformed and she comes to believe that love must be completely unselfish.

In true Gilbert and Sullivan style, her childhood love, Grosvenor, arrives and they pledge their hearts. Patience then realises that she cannot have Grosvenor because he is too perfect and loving him would, in fact, be satisfying and somewhat selfish. They part, bereft.

Grosvenor suffers from "the fatal flaw of perfection" and all women who meet him instantly fall in love with him. He is, of course, an aerobics instructor.

Bunthorne decides to raffle himself off since Patience is not interested. Just as he is about to find out who has won him, Patience offers to marry him. She has worked out that being with him would be completely unselfish since she does not love him at all. Just when the women are turning back to their Army Reserve fiances, Grosvenor arrives and the women fall in love with him, callously abandoning the men again.

Patience is dreadfully unhappy with Bunthorne and seeks out Grosvenor. Bunthorne sees them embracing and plots with Jane who has stayed true to him.

Bunthorne threatens Grosvenor with a curse. Gratefuly, Grosvenor gives up being perfect. Patience finds that now he is not perfect she can love him with good conscience. The women return to their loves in the Army Reserve, and for a while it look like Bunthorne will get Jane...



YOLANDE SUFFERN




In April Michael performed with the Australian Opera in DIE MEISTERSING VAN NURNBERG as a member of the extra chorus


With DVS, David was the Lord Chancellor in IOLANTHE, and Jack Point in last year's production, YEOMAN OF THE GUARD.




DARREN ROSENFELD


JANE SMOLENAERS (right)


SIMON NEWNHAM



DIAMOND VALLEY SINGERS

In 1985 Ian Lowe approached Mavis and Graham Ford for help in staging TRIAL BY JURY with the Eltham Community Orchestra. Rehearsals began and "The Valley Musical Society" (later to become Diamond Valley Singers) was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public and to raise money for charity. So far, over \$30,000 have been donated to World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services and the Eltham Emergency Relief Fund.

Since TRIAL BY JURY, singers and orchestra have combined in more Gilbert and Sullivan productions (HMS PINAFORE, THE MIKADO, RUDDIGORE, THE PIRATES OF PENZANCE, PRINCESS IDA, THE GONDOLIERS, IOLANTHE and YEOMAN OF THE GUARD) as well as Handel's MESSIAH and Haydn's THE SEASONS.

DVS has also performed other works, including Mendelsohnn's ELIJAH and Maunder's OLIVET TO CALVARY and taken part in local Carols by Candelight services and sung in the Massed Choir at Carols by Candelight at the Sidney Myer Music Bowl on Christmas Eve.

New members are always welcome. We rehearse on Wednesday nights at Diamond Creek Uniting Church. Rehearsals for Haydn's CREATION (for performances in November) commence on Wednesday, 3rd August at 8.00 p.m. For more information contact Graham Ford (Artistic Director) on 439 3267
