Open House Christian Involvement Centre


Open House, which began win ivanhoe some 26 years ago, maintains a program of support for needy people in the community. The work is wholistic in nature and seeks to provide care, friendship and informal training in a supportive and encouraging atmosphere.

There are three centres:

- Ivanhoe, where there are clubs and a drop-in-activities centre for adults and young people, open till 11 pm;

Merrie England — story by Basil Hood

Diamond Valley Singers have gained quite a reputation for originality. This adaptation of Basil Hood's book includes the fantasy world of Lewis Carroll.

Act 1: Our show opens in a theatre in Shakespeare's time. Two actors while fumbling around backstage fall 'through a looking glass' into a strange and unfamiliar "England" where the inhabitants are playing cards, and various other Alice in Wonderland-type characters. It is May Day and the May Queen is delighting in the attentions of all the males except for one of the foresters, Long Tom, who is in love with a wild free spirit called Meg-on-the-prowl. Tom's brother Ben believes Meg to be a witch. Meg arrives and withstands the ridicule of all the townspeople. Soon they run after her in a witch-hunt.

The land is ruled by the Queen of Hearts, Queen Angina (Angina Regina!). She is in love with Valentine and believes he returns her feelings. Unfortunately for her, he is secretly in love with one of her ladies-in-waiting, Angie. The wicked Jack of Spades, Baron Black Jack, has his sights set on the throne and would take any opportunity to discredit Valentine in her eyes.

Angie has lost a love letter sent to her by Valentine, and she fears that they will be discovered. She confesses this to Valentine.

The townspeople have captured Meg and aim to give her a witch's trial. She is rescued by Black Jack at Tom's request. Meg shows him Angie's letter she had found in the forest. He recognizes the writing and sees an opportunity to shame Valentine in the Queen's eyes.

The Queen arrives, Black Jack exposes the lovers, forcing Valentine to confess his love for Angie. Angina imprisons Angie and banishes Jack. Meg too is to be imprisoned and burned as a witch.

Act 2: Meg enters having escaped through a secret passage under the castle wall which leads to a trap door in Herne's Oak. She has rescued Angie from the castle. They go back into hiding with Ben and Tom.

The queen arrives. She aims to poison Angie. Jack is on his way to the castle to rescue Angie when he meets Meg.

The May Queen and her dancers are also on their way to the castle to perform for the Queen. They are dancing when Jack enters and asks if her can pretend to be one of them so he can enter the castle.

The men are to also perform a play of Robin Hood, with Valentine as Robin and Tom as Little John. They rehearse the play then go on their way.

Meg and Angie come out of hiding, and Meg reunites the lovers. Black Jack finds them and formulates a plan to cause the Queen to pardon them and free them to marry. This removes any obstacle to him realizing his ambition to marry Angina.

The play of St. George and the Dragon is in progress when Tom appears, dressed as Herne the Hunter. Black Jack tells the Queen that Herne only can be seen by a queen if she is about to commit a crime. She is so frightened that she pardons Meg and Angie on the spot making Angie and Valentine are free to marry.



James Sloane — Baker





Diamond Valley Singers (DVS)

In 1985 lan Lowe approached Mavis and Graham Ford for help in staging *Trial by Jury* with the Eltham Community Orchestra (as it was then called) for a concert in aid of World Vision. Rehearsals began and "Valley Musical Society" (later to become the Diamond Valley Singers) was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public, and to raise money for charity. So far well over \$80 000 has been donated to organisations such as World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services, Eltham Emergency Relief Fund and Open House.

Since the initial production of *Trial by Jury*, Diamond Valley Singers and the DVECO have combined in most Gilbert and Sullivan productions (sometimes adapted), as well as Strauss' *Die Fledermaus*, Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld*, and an Australian adaption of Lehar's most popular operetta, *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek*.

They also perform annually one major oratorio. Over the years these have included *The Messiah* (Handel), *The Seasons* and *The Creation* (Haydn), *The Last Judgement* (Spohr), *Fantasia on Christmas Carols* (Vaughan Williams), *Elijah* (Mendelssohn), *Magnificat* and *The Christmas Oratorio* (Bach), *Ode on St Cecilia's Day* (Purcell) and *Requiem* and *Mass in C Minor* (Mozart).

The Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra (DVECO)

The orchestra has been in existence for twenty six years. It performs three or four programs annually including symphonies, concertos, ballet concerts and children's performances, as well as the annual stage show with the Diamond Valley Singers.

The orchestra is always keen to welcome new players, particularly of string instruments. As part of its role in encouraging new musicians, the orchestra supports a feeder string orchestra, which caters for string players from beginners to Grade 4, training them in the subtle art of orchestral playing.
