#### Open House Christian Involvement Centre

Open House, which began in Ivanhoe some 27 years ago, maintains a program of support for needy people in the community. The work is wholistic in nature and seeks to provide care, friendship and informal training in a supportive and encouraging atmosphere.

There are three centres:

- Ivanhoe, where there are clubs and a drop-in-activities centre for adults and young people, open till 11 pm;
- Hurstbridge, where eight young people live in two houses while recovering from alcoholism, drug dependency and mental illness. They learn living skills, undertake re-training programs and work, before reentering the community.
- Seymour, which is a base for a small-group camping program for teenagers and young adults.

#### Directors' notes

Brigadoon has always been a favourite of mine since I was a small child. I saw the movie and spent the next month or so floating around the house in a long petticoat pretending to be Cyd Charisse. Irrespective of any shortcoming I have become aware of as an adult, the movie will always have a special place in my childhood memories. Quite a few years ago, I became acquainted with the stage show and realised how many wonderful songs were not used in the film. In that production I played the role of Meg and loved every minute of the experience.

When DVS decided on Brigadoon for this year's show I was very eager to direct, and in so doing, enrich further my previous associations with the show.

The show was chosen after discussion sessions about the future direction the group should take. It is the first in a line of more recent and popular musicals, designed to give more scope and enjoyment both to our group members and our audiences.

In this year's production we again join forces with Mary Wright and the Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra. The show is filled with wonderful songs and we are so fortunate to have an orchestra to enhance the performance. The show is also chock-a-block with dancing and Julie Geddes, who has been associated with the group since childhood, has tackled that formidable task. Her choreography is imaginative, lively and suitably Scottish in flavour. She herself dances the part of Jean the "soon to be" bride.

We have an excellent line up of talented principals with whom I have thoroughly enjoyed working. Our chorus, always a strong point in all our shows, is large in number and have enthusiastically thrown themselves into the challenges set by the show.

Another first with this show is the increased number of scene changes required. This was a challenge in a theatre with little wing space and no fly tower. We have been fortunate to have a team of group members who worked tirelessly to build and paint exciting sets to compliment the production.

Costuming as always is an important element and sourcing kilts has given our costuming ladies, many a headache. Not to be beaten, however, they have successfully ensured that all our men will look resplendent in their kilts and our ladies will, as always, look beautiful. In all it has been a very enriching and exciting venture for all of us.

I would like to thank all those who have contributed in any way to the success of the show and made my job so much more manageable.

I hope our audiences enjoy our offering as much as we have done preparing it, and that they continue to support us in the years to come. Next year we will perform *Oklahoma*.

#### The story of Brigadoon

#### Act 1 Time, in the 1930s

Two hunters (Tommy and Jeff) from New York are lost in Scotland, when they hear mysterious singing and go to investigate the sudden appearance of a village that is not on the map. The village awakes and goes to the fair at MacConnachy Square.

Tommy and Jeff arrive at MacConnachy Square and are invited to join wedding festivities for Charlie and Jean. Tommy, unhappily engaged back in New York, is starting to fall for Fiona, and invites himself to go with her to collect 'Heather on the hill'.

Meg has invited the weary Jeff back to her open shed, where he hopes to get some sleep. She, however, has other ideas but instead exciting Jeff, he falls asleep. She takes off her shoes, sits on a rocking chair, and begins to rock with a smile on her face.

Jean's friends are helping her to pack up to leave her parents' home. Harry arrives to deliver a new waistcoat and expresses his bitterness that he has lost Jean to Charlie and furthermore can never leave Brigadoon to advance his education and improve himself. As Jeannie is getting dressed for the wedding Charlie takes to serenading her from outside the room.

Tommy and Jeff discover that there is a mystery here; the village is 200 years old. Tommy is told that Murdoch must provide the explanation to strangers. Two hundred years ago the village was part of a miracle that preserved it from witches. It reappears for one day only each 100 years. No-one may leave, or the miracle will be over, but a stranger may come to live there if that person truly loves someone in Brigadoon.

The Clans enter for the wedding ceremony. The joyous wedding dance is interrupted when Harry announces that he is leaving Brigadoon, which will destroy the miracle. He runs off, chased by all the men.


#### Act 2

The men are chasing Harry to stop him leaving. Harry is found dead, before he has left Brigadoon. They take his body back.

Fiona is relieved to learn that Tommy has not left and professes her love for him. He too tells her that after one short day, he feels he cannot live without her for fear of joining the other lonely men he sees in life.

The merry-making of the villagers(assisted by Meg's singing) is suddenly interrupted by the sombre droning of bagpipes. Everyone steps back in horror, as Donald enters, carrying the body of his son, Harry.

Maggie dances the traditional funeral dance of mourning, accompanied by solemn pipes and drums. At the end of the funeral, Tommy decides to leave. Reluctantly, Tommy tells Fiona that he does not trust his own feelings and must leave, yet they affirm their mutual love. Brigadoon disappears. Tommy slowly exits.



Three nights later, back in Scotland, Tommy cannot believe that the village was just a dream. As they are about to leave, the chorus begins to sing in the distance. Suddenly, a sleepy Murdoch appears in the mist and remarks that Tommy must truly love Fiona, for he was awakened in the middle of the night. He adds that when you love someone deeply, anything is possible, even miracles.

Jeff is bewildered, as Tommy leaves with Murdoch to join Fiona in Brigadoon.

#### Lynne Counsel — Director


Lynne, an active art/craft and drama teacher, has worked for the past thirty years in both amateur and professional theatre as a director, performer, set and costume designer and make-up artist. 

She has continued to be a part of DVS productions, has performed in the Hot Mikado with Donvale Christian College and in dance school productions.




#### Paul Dernelley — Stuart Cameron

#### Gerard Fullarton — Mr Murdoch










#### Geoff Vaughan — MacGregor

## Diamond Valley Singers (DVS)

In 1985 Ian Lowe (the current president) approached Mavis and Graham Ford for help in staging *Trial by Jury* with the Eltham Community Orchestra (as it was then called) for a concert in aid of World Vision. Rehearsals began and "Valley Musical Society" (later to become the Diamond Valley Singers) was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public, and to raise money for charity. So far well over \$80 000 has been donated to organisations such as World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services, Eltham Emergency Relief Fund and Open House.

Since the initial production of *Trial by Jury*, Diamond Valley Singers and the DVECO have combined in most Gilbert and Sullivan productions (sometimes adapted), as well as Strauss' *Die Fledermaus*, Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld*, and an Australian adaption of Lehar's most popular operetta, *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek*.

They also perform annually one major oratorio. Over the years these have included The Messiah (Handel), The Seasons and The Creation (Haydn), The Last Judgement (Spohr), Fantasia on Christmas Carols (Vaughan Williams), Elijah (Mendelssohn), Magnificat and The Christmas Oratorio (Bach), Ode on St Cecilia's Day (Purcell) and Requiem and Mass in C Minor (Mozart). Last year Brahm's Requiem, and this year (in contrast) Carmina Burana by Carl Orff.

New members are always welcome. There are no auditions for chorus parts. We rehearse on Wednesday nights at Diamond Creek Uniting Church. Contact Graham Ford (9439 3267).

## The Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra (DVECO)

The orchestra has been in existence for twenty eight years. It performs three or four programs annually including symphonies, concertos, ballet concerts and children's performances, as well as the annual stage show with the Diamond Valley Singers. The orchestra is always keen to welcome new players, particularly of string instruments.

As part of its role in encouraging new musicians, the orchestra supports a feeder string orchestra, which caters for string players from beginners to Grade 4, training them in the subtle art of orchestral playing. This group is taken by the orchestra's main conductor, Mary Wright.
