OPEN HOUSE CHRISTIAN INVOLVEMENT CENTRES



OKLAHOMA

Welcome to the twenty first annual musical production by the Diamond Valley Singers and the Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra.

DIRECTORS NOTES

I've always known that *Oklahoma* was a major watershed in the history of musical comedy. It was the first successful collaboration of Richard Rodgers and Oscar Hammerstein II, but it actually changed the nature of the beast. *Oklahoma* featured real people, with flawed characters, as the heroes, while there was a villain to be taken quite seriously. Up until *Oklahoma*, the American operettas had been light frothy pieces, *Showboat* being an exception.

However, it was only when I came to direct the show this year that I delved into the various characters and realized how complex they were. Laurey and Curley make such of mess of their relationship that one wonders if they would have ever got together but for the crisis caused by Jud.

Doing a show with such complex characters, the casting was important. The success of *Brigadoon* meant we had more than the usual number auditioning, and the cast is a good mix of established members and experienced new talent. Jennie, Alan and Lucas have all sung minor roles for us in the past, while Deborah Oates, Meg Warren, John Leahy and Damian Uselioates bring a vast wealth of experience from other companies.

Another newcomer is young Amara Wagner. She sang at the Diamond Valley Vocal Eisteddfod last year and expressed a wish to sing in a musical. She had auditioned for a number of companies, but, being blind, had been unsuccessful. The committee felt this was something we could encompass and made the offer, which was accepted with alacrity – though Heinz, her father, had to join in too! Thanks also to Kath Buckingham who quickly warmed to Amara and elected herself as stage mother, and the rest of the cast for making her feel so welcome.

Oklahoma is a major dancing show, and we have been very fortunate to have Sarah Lemcke share the choreography with Julie Geddes. Thanks to these young ladies, who have both performed with us in the past as well. Thanks also to Maxine Lemcke, who ably assisted with direction and made my job so much easier.

Following some concerns expressed last year we sought expert advice that indicated that, without the orchestra pit being closed, some audio system would be required. So we've bitten the bullet for the first time, and hope this adds to your enjoyment.

We hope you enjoy our second foray into the world of musical comedy and will leave with a smile on your face and familiar tunes running through your head.

DIAMOND VALLEY SINGERS (DVS)

In 1985 Ian Lowe approached Mavis and Graham Ford for assistance in staging *Trial by Jury* with Eltham Community Orchestra (now DVECO) for a concert in aid of World Vision. Rehearsal began and the "Valley Musical Society" (Diamond Valley Singers) was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public, and to raise money for charity. So far well over \$80,000 has been donated to organizations such as World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services, Eltham Emergency Relief Fund and Open House.

Since the initial production of *Trial by Jury*, Diamond Valley Singers and the DVECO have combined in most Gilbert and Sullivan productions (sometimes adapted), as well as Strauss' *Die Fledermaus*, Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld*, an Australian adaption of Lehar's most popular operetta, *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek* and, in 2004, *Brigadoon*..

They also perform annually one major oratorio. Over the years these have included *The Messiah* (Handel), *The Seasons* and *The Creation* ((Haydn), *The Last Judgement* (Spohr), *Fantasia on Christmas Carols* (Vaughan Williams), *Elijah* (Mendelssohn), *Magnificat* and *The Christmas Oratorio* (Bach), *Ode on St Cecilia's Day* (Purcell), *Requiem* and *Mass in C Minor* (Mozart) and *Carmina Burana* (Carl Orff).

THE DIAMOND VALLEY AND ELTHAM COMMUNITY ORCHESTRA (DVECO)

This year, the orchestra celebrates it's thirtieth anniversary. It performs three or four programmes annually including symphonies, concertos, ballet concerts and children's performances, as well as the annual stage show with the Diamond Valley Singers.

The orchestra is always keen to welcome new players, particularly of string instruments. As part of its role in encouraging new musicians, the orchestra supports a feeder string orchestra, which caters for string players from beginners to Grade 4, training them in the subtle art of orchestral playing. This group is taken by the orchestra's main conductor, Mary Wright.

Practices are scheduled weekly, on Wednesdays, at Briar Hill Primary School. The feeder group starts at 6.30 pm and the main group at 8.00pm. For any further information, call Mary or Derek Wright on 9434 2147

MARY WRIGHT - Conductor

"This is Mary's 6th show with the Diamond Valley Singers, having previously conducted The Mikado, The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek, Merrie England, The Gondoliers and Brigadoon. STORY Act 1

On a radiant summer morning in Indian Territory not long after the turn of the century, Aunt Eller sits on her porch churning butter and looking out over her farmstead. Curly, a local coyboy, comes to call. Curly and Eller's niece, Laurey, have a lot in common - both are equally smitten with the other, and both are too proud and stubborn to admit it. When Curly grandly offers to take Laurey to the box social that evening, Laurey claims that he can't escort her in style and refuses to believe that he has rented a classy rig for the occasion. Jud Fry, Laurey's hired hand, settles the matter by announcing that he will take her to the social and because she is scared of Jud, who has a morose, vindictive temperament, she is too frightened to turn him down. Curly invites Aunt Eller to ride with him.

Laurey's friend, Ado Annie, is caught between two fellows too. Will Parker has just returned from Kansas City where he earned \$50 in a rodeo - the exact sum Ado Annie's father, Andrew Carnes, told Will he had to come up with if he wanted to marry her. However, during Will's absence Ado Annie has become transfixed by the Persian peddler man, Ali Hakim, whose sales pitches always leave her swooning. Ado Annie may not know which way to turn but her father does: Will, since he already spent the \$50 on wedding gifts for Annie and technically no longer has the cash, has lost his chance at marriage - while Ali Hakim has been so forward with Annie that nothing short of a shotgun wedding will do!

Laurey is confused about her love for Curly, and about Jud, of whom she is terrified, but has used his invitation just to make Curly jealous. After a short reconciliation between the two, Curly goes to see Jud in his smokehouse. Curly paints a beautiful picture of just how popular Jud would be - at his own funeral and there is an angry confrontation about Laurey. Feeling mocked, alone now in his room, Jud confronts himself, his lonely fantasies, his bleak existence that fills him with anger and violence.

Laurey still wants to clear her mind between Curly and Jud. Her girl friends ridicule her and offer their own homely advice; she drifts into a dream - a ballet sequence in which she is to marry Curly, but he is killed by Jud, who abducts her. As she wakens, both men arrive, and Jud hauls her off to the party, leaving Curly dejected.

Act II

At the box social that night lots of men bid for Laurey's hamper but, as the bidding rises, so does the tension as Jud and Curly square off. Curly sells his saddle, his horse and then even his gun to raise enough cash to buy the hamper and the right to escort Laurey, which frustrates and angers Jud. Laurey sends Jud packing. Jud runs off, and finally, Laurey and Curly confess their love for each other. Ali Hakim, still trying to manoeuvre his way out of marrying Ado Annie, contrives to bid \$50 for all the gifts Will bought in Kansas City. With cash in hand, and a few rules in mind, Will approaches Ado Annie again, and this time they set the date.

Three weeks later, Laurey and Curly are married. Gertie Cummings, an annoying flirt who couldn't get her hands on Curly, has managed to also snare a husband - Ali Hakim. Everyone is celebrating. The wedding festivities pall, however, when Jud Fry stumbles in, uninvited, unwelcome and drunk. He gets into a fight with Curly and, in the ensuing melée, the drunken Jud falls on his own knife and is killed. Curly's friends don't want him to have to spend his wedding night in jail and so, a trial is quickly held on the spot and Curly is acquitted. With their friends and loved ones waving them on, Curly and Laurey leave for their honeymoon.




RYAN HOLLIDAY - Fred




DEBORAH OATES - Ado Annie (1st, 2nd 8pm, 6th, 9th 2pm)

JOHN LEAHEY - Jud Fry


