John Leahy – Wild Bill Hickock










Alan Flint - Joe, the bartender

The story of 'Calamity Jane'

The well-known and very popular film starring Doris Day was made in response to the hugely successful Annie get your gun from a rival studio and has clear similarities. The stage show was adapted from the film, and added several very successful numbers to the film version. The story is based on the true-life adventures of the real Calamity Jane. Martha Jane Canary (1848-1903) was born in Princeton, Missouri. This hard drinking woman wore men's clothing, used their bawdy language, chewed tobacco and was handy with a gun. She travelled from Arizona through the Dakota territories during her rough life.

In the stage version, we are taken to Deadwood, Dakota Territory, in 1876. It is largely the abode of men, and where Indian scout Calamity Jane is as hardriding, boastful, and handy with a gun as any; quite an overpowering personality.

Fuss-budget Henry Miller, owner of Deadwood's hotel-bar-theatre, nervously awaits the arrival of the lovely eastern actress, Frances Fryer, to embellish his show. His niece, Susan, assures him that Calamity will bring the stagecoach to town on time. And so Calamity does, but the "actress" turns out to be a young man, "Francis" and not "Frances" of the hoped-for opposite sex.

The show must go on, and "Millie" contrives to cross-dress Fryer as a woman, but when the latter's wig falls off during the show, the local characters rise in noisy anger. Only Calamity's trusty pistol restores order, and calm is maintained with her promise that, to make amends, "Millie" will import to Deadwood the east's most glamorous star - Adelaide Adams herself. The men are overjoyed, but Wild Bill, Lt. Danny Gilmartin and "Millie" know full well that Adelaide Adams wouldn't be caught dead in Deadwood. Calamity storms out headed for Chicago to bring back Adelaide Adams.

In Chicago, Calamity mistakes Adelaide's maid, Katie Brown, for the great actress herself. Before she is aware of it, she is stage-coaching Katie back to Deadwood where Katie is greeted in high excitement as the famed Adelaide Adams.

Back in Deadwood, Katie breaks down at the opening show, since she is unnerved by Fryer when he becomes aware of her true identity. Only Calamity's masterful control of the audience saves the day. Supported by Calamity, Katie gives a show-stopping performance, 'her own way'. All of Deadwood's hearts are won, not the least being the hearts of Danny and Wild Bill.

Aball is given in honour of the new commander at Fort Scully, and Calamity, dressed in Katie's finery, is the belle of the ball. Her hour of triumph explodes when she finds Katie kissing Danny. In a fit of jealous anger she orders Katie to leave town, but in their loss, Wild Bill (who has lost his Katie) and Calamity find how much they love each other. It was Bill whom Calamity loved all the time, not Danny. Her realization is expressed in the hauntingly lovely *My Secret Love*.

The show closes joyously with all of Deadwood's citizens attending a triple wedding: Calamity to Wild Bill, Katie to Danny Gilmartin and, unexpectedly, Henry's niece Susan to Francis Fryer (with an 'i').

In reality, Calamity Jane never did marry Bill Hickock, although they knew each other, but you can do your own internet research!

Lynne Counsel, Director

Lynne, an active art/craft and drama teacher, has worked for the past thirty years in both amateur and professional theatre as a director, performer, set and costume designer and makeup artist. She has directed many plays musicals and pantomimes, amongst them, This old Man came Rolling Home, Brigadoon, There's More to Life than Money and Sex and The Hobyahs, as well as numerous school productions, including The Wizard of Oz and The Hobbitt. Lynne's character roles include Aunt Abby (Arsenic and Old Lace), Elvira (Blythe Spirit), Harry the Horse (Guys and Dolls), Meg (Brigadoon) and Eliza (Pygmalion). For seven years she appeared regularly in Theatre Restaurant productions and is at present an active member of The Templestowe Entertainers. This is her eighth show with DVS.

Maxine Lemcke, Director

Maxine has been inv olved wityh theatre for many years, with companies including Night Owl, Northern Musical Theatre and Northern Youth Theatre. After many years of performing with Diamond Valley Singers, Maxine has decided to make a foray into directing with last year's Oklahoma and this year's Oklahoma and this year's Calamity Jane. Her prior shows with DVS include The Mikado, The Gondoliers, Brigadoon and Orpheus in the Underworld.





Director's Notes - Lynne Counsel

On hearing that Calamity Jane was chosen for this year's show, I was delighted and eager to direct. I had grown up on a steady diet of musical comedy and this was one of my all time favourites. When I first became acquainted with the stage show I realised how many enjoyable songs, dance and chorus numbers were not used in the screen version.

Diamond Valley Singers have always been renowned for their choral work and this show is no exception. We again join forces with Mary Wright and the Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra. We are fortunate to have this long standing association to enhance our performances.

We have an excellent line up of talented principals with whom I have thoroughly enjoyed working. Our chorus, under the direction of Ian Lowe, have enthusiastically met the challenges set by the show. Many of them are treading the boards for the first time in their lives, and it is wonderful to be able to share that experience with them.

It is a special feature of DVS that chorus members are not auditioned. This allows opportunities they would never have otherwise. Many have started in this way, sometimes moving on to minor and even major principal roles within DVS or other companies.

I have also been fortunate to have an excellent direction team with which to work. Julie Geddes, once again showing her flair for imaginative and exciting choreography, Ian Lowe as Musical Director, Mary Wright as conductor of the orchestra and costume designer and especially my co-director, Maxine Lemcke. Maxine is creative, supportive, very hardworking and reliable, and has become a great friend. I have thoroughly enjoyed working with her and am very grateful to have been able to share this show with her.

I would also like to thank all those who have contributed in any way to the success of the show and made our job so much more manageable. I hope our audiences enjoy this show as much as we have done preparing it, and that they continue to support us in the years to come.

Note from the Producer, Ian Lowe

Calamity Jane is a creature of its time. It was written in the 1962 when men were less sensitve about offending women than most are today. Of course it also tried to reflect the highly macho culture of a tough Western town in South Dakota in 1876. We hope you will take the dialogue in the spirit of fun, and not be offended. Several times John (our 'Bill') has felt the need to apologise to the ladies present when rehearsing his dialogue.

The gun pictured on each page is the model owned by the real original Wild Bill Hickock (sometimes spelled Hickok). It seems a fitting symbol for this show where masculinity (for males or Calamity) depends on free use of such a weapon.

Diamond Valley Singers (DVS)

This year DVS celebrates 21 years of music making! In 1985 the local orchestra conductor, lan Lowe, approached Mavis and Graham Ford for help in staging *Trial by Jury* with the Eltham Community Orchestra (as it was then called) for a concert in aid of World Vision. Rehearsals began and "Valley Musical Society" (later to become the Diamond Valley Singers) was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public, and to raise money for charity. So far well over \$80 000 has been donated to organisations such as World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services, Eltham Emergency Relief Fund and Open House.

Since the initial production of *Trial by Jury*, Diamond Valley Singers and the DVECO have combined in most Gilbert and Sullivan productions (sometimes adapted), as well as Strauss' *Die Fledermaus*, Offenbach's *Orpheus in the Underworld*, and an Australian adaption of Lehar's most popular operetta, *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek*. The last few years have seen us doing American musicals: *Brigadoon, Oklahoma* and now *Calamity Jane*. Next year it will be *Fiddler on the Roof*.

They also perform annually one major oratorio. Over the years these have included *The Messiah* (Handel), *The Seasons* and *The Creation* (Haydn), *The Last Judgement* (Spohr), *Fantasia on Christmas Carols* (Vaughan Williams), *Elijah* (Mendelssohn), *Magnificat* and *The Christmas Oratorio* (Bach), *Ode on St Cecilia's Day* (Purcell) and *Requiem* and *Mass in C Minor* (Mozart). In recent years we performed Brahms' *Requiem*, *Carmina Burana* by Carl Orff and the Mascagni opera *Cavalleria Rusticana*. This yearwe look forward to joining with Yarra Valley Singers and Preston Symphony Orchestra in Verdi's masterpiece, his *Requiem*.

New members are always welcome. There are no auditions for chorus parts. We rehearse on Wednesday nights at Diamond Creek Uniting Church. Contact Artistic Director Graham Ford (9439 3267).

The Diamond Valley and Eltham Community Orchestra (DVECO)

The orchestra has been in existence for thirty years. It performs three or four programs annually including symphonies, concertos, ballet concerts and children's performances, as well as the annual stage show with the Diamond Valley Singers. The orchestra is always keen to welcome new players, particularly of string instruments.

As part of its role in encouraging new musicians, the orchestra supports a feeder string orchestra, which caters for string players from beginners to Grade 4, training them in the subtle art of orchestral playing. This group is taken by the orchestra's main conductor, Mary Wright. Practices are scheduled weekly, on Wednesdays, at Briar Hill Primary School.
