

Director's Notes - Deborah Uselioates

Fiddler on the Roof is a classic musical; however, my love of this musical comes in the fact that it has much more depth to offer an audience than many of its contemporaries. It is a musical filled with laughter, entertainment, tears and the questioning of life and the paths that are taken by those brave enough to challenge it. Tevye is a Jewish father in 1905 on the eve of the Russian revolution. His life seems to be following the expected path until his three eldest daughters unconventionally choose husbands going against both cultural and religious tradition. This occurs in conjunction with the racial prejudices of the Russians, driving out the Jews from their villages. While Fiddler deals with Jewish faith and circumstances of the early 20th century, it was also written in a sense to explore the Jewish American community of the 60's. The truth it held then has as much relevance to our lives today and will continue to do so into the future as it explores many of the realities of human existence such as family, community, religion, faith, cultural expectations and tradition.

From a performer's perspective, Fiddler has much to offer an actor with principal characters, supporting characters, minor characters and cameos. Yes, it requires them to sing and dance but more essentially to use their acting skills to engage in deep emotions through portraying the tumultuous journey each human being encounters in life and then in reaction either challenge the philosophies which we inherit or simply reinforce them through repetition like those before us.

My aim as a director is to always produce an ensemble piece. Not a performance piece which merely promotes some stand out performances of principals and uses the 'chorus' to simply fill the stage. However, an ensemble piece passes beyond the performers with a production such as this requiring over a hundred people. They have done the superb and obvious jobs such as musical direction, conducting and producing, down to supplying the afternoon tea or an essential prop. simply because they have a desire to give and be part of a group. All of this combined makes DVS in the true sense a community theatre group. Every single person is an essential element in an intertwining chain and therefore, rather than name individuals I wish to express my thanks to all those involved whether their contribution was large or small and even unknown to me. However, I do need to specifically mention one main group and they are the performers. Whether experienced or of no experience each member of the cast has been dedicated to months of preparation, strenuous rehearsals and at times a demanding director who expects them to place themselves in foreign situations and simply transform their knowledge into an unknown world.

Enjoy the story that Fiddler has to offer tonight, the performances of these amateur actors and the myriad of people whose contributions have transformed ideas into a reality, sacrificing much time and effort to bring together a fantastic ensemble piece that has made this a rewarding and fulfilling experience for me as a director who is simply another link in the chain. Thank you, all of you.


Deborah Uselioates, Director & choreographer

The story of 'Fiddler on the Roof'

Based on two short stories written by Sholom Aleichem, a Yiddish short-story writer, dramatist, and humorist, born in Russia in 1859, the setting is 1905, the year that Aleichem fled Russia to escape the pogroms that take place in this show.

Tevye describes his village and introduces its people to the audience. Then suddenly he turns, raises his arms and stamps his foot, the glorious score begins and the stage bursts into heart pounding vitality ... and we're off into this alternately joyous/heart rending story of one man's family in Anatevka, a village in the Czar's Russia as revolution is brewing outside and also inside this selfcontained town.

The time-honored roles on which the story rests are beautifully stated in *Tradition*. Rules are about to be challenged and reexamined by Tevye, Golde and their daughters, of which he had five. This is a great burden for a poor milkman who has to find five dowries. Marriages were arranged by a professional matchmaker, Yente. In *Matchmaker* the hearts of the minds of these young girls are revealed as they timidly address their hopes and fears over the choices made for them. A wealthy widower, the butcher Lazar Wolf has decided to end his loneliness by asking the matchmaker to arrange for him to marry Tevye's oldest daughter Tzeitel. For the impoverished Tevye and Golde this is indeed an impressive match and a rousing negotiation between Tevye and the butcher at the local tavern soon turns into drunken revelry. In a brilliant moment, which is the first indication of the threat to come, a young officer extends his hand to Tevye to dance with him ... the hesitation and tension is palpable as Tevye reluctantly reciprocates and inexorably gets drawn into the camaraderie of alcoholic exuberance.

But Tzeitel's dismay at not marrying her childhood companion and soul mate Motel, the timid tailor, melts Tevye's heart and he breaks the agreement. This he explains to Golde in a fabricated nightmare which reveals that Tzeitel should marry the tailor. Their wedding is a short story in itself as it transcends from joyous celebration to antagonism between Wolf and Tevye over the broken vow to the destruction and then fear as the pogrom begins. Act I ends sorrowfully.

Tevye's second daughter Hodel squeezes through the newly-opened crack in the wall of tradition by announcing, not asking, for Tevye's blessing to marry the rebellious scholar, Perchik. But the third daughter, Chava goes too far for Tevye, falling in love with young Russian Fyedka, and Tevye's struggle between his heart and his faith is won by faith. Heartbroken, he excommunicates her from the family.

However these issues pale as the Constable announces that the entire village must "disappear in three days". Powerless they go, Tzeitel to Warsaw (to the holocaust to come), Lazar to Chicago, Hodel and Perchik to Siberia, Yente to Jerusalem, and the others to relatives whom they have had no time to contact in America. In a moving finale they trudge away from their beloved village to the sad strains of *Anatevka*.






Diamond Valley Singers (DVS)

This year DVS celebrates 22 years of music making! In 1985 the local orchestra conductor, lan Lowe, approached Mavis and Graham Ford for help in staging *Trial by Jury* with the Eltham Community Orchestra (as it was then called) for a concert in aid of World Vision. Rehearsals began and "Valley Musical Society" (later to become the Diamond Valley Singers) was formed to provide local singers with opportunities to be heard in public, and to raise money for charity. So far well over \$85 000 has been donated to organisations such as World Vision, Community Aid Abroad, Eltham/Diamond Valley Housing Service, Harrison Youth Services, Eltham Emergency Relief Fund and Open House.

Since the initial production of *Trial by Jury*, Diamond Valley Singers have performed most Gilbert and Sullivan shows. In the last few years they have presented American musicals: *Brigadoon*, *Oklahoma*, *Calamity Jane* and now *Fiddler on the Roof*. Next year it will be the exotic *Kismet* set in old Baghdad.

They also perform annually one major oratorio such as *The Messiah* (Handel). Last year they joined with Yarra Valley Singers and Preston Symphony Orchestra in Verdi's powerful *Requiem*. This year they also sing with Yarra Valley Singers, in Faure's gentle *Requiem*.

The Eltham Orchestras Inc.

This year the orchestra performs under its new name Eltham Orchestra, which forms part of "The Eltham Orchestras Inc" and includes Beginner String Group, Senior String Group and Eltham Orchestra.
