This version has all that and more. We are transported to the fictional Australian Embassy in Paris at the turn of the 20th century. The poor Aussies are rather out of their depth in sophisticated Paris and would not survive without their wily French translator.

The script is brilliantly adapted by Frank Hatherley, an Australian who spent many years working for Thames and the BBC in London. The dialogue sparkles with wit and just a pinch of naughtiness.

It is fifteen years since DVS's first production of *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek*, so we felt it was time to bring this delightful romp back for another airing.

We have a wonderful cast led by two young opera students, Teresa Ingrilli and Andrew Lees, who have already made their mark in the Victorian Opera scene. They are supported by a talented lineup of principals and ensemble members, with whom we have thoroughly enjoyed working.

This year we are again fortunate to be working with Mary Wright and the Eltham Orchestra. Mary has also worked as costume designer for this production, making the majority of the beautiful costumes herself.

We would like to gratefully acknowledge our musical director, Ian Lowe, choreographers, Julie Wright and Narada Edgar, lighting designer, Ian Craig, lighting and sound crews and our stage manager, Maxine Lemcke. also the tireless efforts of Trevor D'Ambrosio, Steve Wilkie and all who assisted with set construction...

It's 1901, the federation of Australia is newly formed, and the new Australian ambassador to France, Sir Zachariah Wentworth, is understandably nervous about his first official function. Apart from his own staff, there is an array of guests to meet a mysterious recently widowed Australian who happened to be in the area and "thought she'd drop in". To add to his woes, the PM has sent a telegram telling him that the old widow should not marry a foreigner or they'd all be looking for new jobs. The new federation could not afford to lose that amount of money.

However, all does not go as planned. The widow, Anna, turns out to be quite young and pretty, with typical Australian contempt for the protcol Zack had been so carefully trying to established. His assistant attache, Danny, seems to be nowhere in sight when needed, and the other two attaches appear to be losing the battle to keep their wives away from various amorous Frenchmen. At least his young wife, Valerie, is no trouble, He has so much to do, it is a pleasure to have her escorted by the nice young cove, Count Camille de Rosillon. Zack has also been fortunate enough to find a Frenchman, Michelin, to translate for the embassy staff, but he appears to understand little of the English that Zack and his staff use and tends to spend most of his time organising everything else. This includes Zack's favourite project, the flag competition for his new country.

Eventually Zack manages to motivate Danny to try and keep the other Frenchmen away from Anna, not knowing that Danny and Anna had been childhood sweethearts. When Zack is not around Danny and Anna spend some time together during that first evening, although Danny does not appear to be having his usual success... Maybe things will go better the next night, when Anna has invited everyone to an Australian fancy dress ball at her rented mansion. Things just seem to go from bad to worse. Zack's Ned Kelly costume is just a bit tight, and he ends up getting lost, missing Anna's lovely song, and not being able to see where he is going with his head jammed in a tin bucket, but there is plenty of beer, so all is not lost. Then there is some real fun, when he discovers one of the Frenchmen in the summerhouse with one of the wives. However, as the Australian women appear on the scene, Zack is heartbroken when he thinks that it is his beloved Valerie in the summerhouse.

Again Zack is embarrassed when it is Anna who steps out of the summerhouse, and there is consternation all round. Danny deserts the party to go back to his favourite haunt, Maxim's, while Anna organises for it to be shut for the evening and the women to present their equivalent can can for the men when Danny returns. The men are mightily impressed with this and, in spite of all the problems encountered during their evening, Danny and Anna finally get together.

Production Manager — Angela Hennel

Director — Lynne Counsel

Lynne, a former art/craft and drama teacher, has worked for over forty years in both amateur and professional theatre as a director, performer, set and costume designer, and make-up artist. She has directed many plays, musicals and pantomimes amongst them, *The Old Man Came Rolling Home, Brigadoon, Kismet* and *Hobyahs* as well as numerous school productions including *The Hobbit* and *Wizard of Oz.* Lynne's character roles include Aunt Abbie (*Arsenie and Old lace*), Elvira (*Blythe Spirit*). Harry the Horse (*Guys and Dolls*) and Yente (*Fiddler on the Roof*). For seven years she appeared regularly in Theatre Restaurant productions. This is her 19th show with DVS. With this show, Lynne and DVS have come full circle, the earlier production of *The Merry Widow of Bluegum Creek* being her first involvement with the group.



Assistant Director — Graham Ford

A joint founder of Diamond Valley Singers, Graham is currently the Artistic Director. He has been a student at the National Theatre Opera School and a Sun Aria semi-finalist. He has previously directed or co-directed many DVS productions. He teaches singing in the local area, and many DVS members are his students. He has sung lead roles on many occasions with Diamond Valley Singers, as well as with the semi-professional Globe Opera, taking leads in *Paint Your Wagon*, *Kiss Me Kate* and *Kismet*. He conducts a couple of other choirs and works for More Than Opera.



Musical Director — Ian Lowe

Ian Lowe was a co-founder of DVS back in 1985, and has worked with the company ever since. Until 1998 he conducted the Eltham Orchestra with DVS in one stage show and one oratorio each year. Then, after 20 years with the orchestra he passed the baton to Mary Wright, and joined the DVS. Since 1999 he has been Musical Director for every stage show. He is now the president, conductor and frequent pianist for the choir, and for this performance is playing keyboard in the pit.



(onductor & (ostumes — Marie-Louise Wright

Originally from Graz Austria, Mary studied music in Australia. She studied Violin with Tim Wachtel, Zefferino Mendes and Warwick Stengards and conducted with Robert Rosen, Peter Clinch, Marvin Rabin, Jerry Nowak, Robert Culver and attended Symphony Australia workshops in Melbourne, Adelaide and Tasmania. She attended workshop with the Royal Australian Navy Band and the Cairns Winter School for Orchestra. Mary conducts Surrey Hills Orchstra, Eltham Orchestra and its two string ensembles and teaches strings at Briar Hill Primary School. She is the past conductor of Henry Touzeau Strings for Melbourne Youth Music, Preston Junior Strings and Victorian Concert Orchestra. Mary conducted many operettas and musical theatre productions including Mikado, Gondoliers, Merry Widow, Merrie England, Iolanthe, Oklahoma, Calamity Jane, Brigadoon, Fiddler on the Roof, Kismet, Carousel, Kiss Me Kate, Pajama Game and her favourite, The Pirates of Penzance as well as Hello Dolly. Mary has been privileged to conduct out of the 9 Beethoven Symphonies.



(o-Choreographer - Narada Edgar

Narada finished her Diploma of Dance Teaching at Box Hill TAFE in 2013 and since then has completed with Honours her Cecchetti Advanced 1 exam. Narada has been involved in the Melbourne theatre scene since 2013. having previously done numerous shows in her home town, Wagga Wagga. Since moving to Melbourne, Narada has been a part of several musicals such as Witches of Eastwick, Gypsy, Cats and Ragtime, and she has recently been appointed choreographer for Waterdale's production of Urinetown, which will open in September. The Merry Widow of Bluegum Creek will be Narada's first production with DVS and will be her debut in Musical Theatre choreography. She would especially like to thank Graham and Lynne for giving her this opportunity and Julie for guiding her through the process.

(o-Choreographer – Julie Wright

Julie has been associated with DVS for most of her life, either on stage, choreographing or in the orchestra pit. Julie trained in dance at the Victorian College of the Arts Secondary School and has appeared in numerous musicals, including Wizard of Oz as Dorothy, Calamity Jane as Katie and Brigadoon as Jean. Julie has also directed Joseph and the Technicolour Dreamcoat for Valley Productions Theatre Company and appeared in NOVA's Beauty and the Beast and Cats. She is thrilled to be back choreographing with Narada, Lynne and Graham this year.

Andrew is currently completing his Bachelor of Music at the Melbourne Conservatorium of Music, and previously studied at the Canberra School of Music. Career highlights have included singing at the Adelaide Festival Theatre (soloist) as a young singer, The Canonisation of Mary Mackillop in Penola, The Centenary of Federation with the Melbourne army band, performing at Swiss and German embassies in Canberra, Opera; Gianni Schicchi (Betto), Mozart Solemn Vespers (Tenor Soloist), Performing self written cabaret at the Adelaide Fringe festival with Alison Flett (the Newsagency Sydney), Cavalleria Rusticana (Turiddu), Contrabandista (chorus) as well as a competition winner at various Eisteddfods. He is also an accomplished violinist, having studied baroque violin at MCM, second violinist for Savoy opera orchestra, first Violinist North Queensland Symphony, eg. various corporate gigs and is a string teacher in the western suburbs of Melbourne.






Lady Valerie Wentworth - Sabrina Surace

Sabrina moved to Melbourne to pursue Post Graduate study at the Victorian College of the Arts and Melbourne Conservatorium. Since moving to Melbourne Sabrina has stared in various productions staged by the Melbourne Opera Company, VCA Opera Studio, Chamber Opera, The Opera Company of Victoria, Percy Grainer Orchestra, Lyric Opera of Melbourne & XL Arts as both soloist and chorister. Sabrina has won a variety of competitions and eisteddfods and has been a finalist in many major singing awards in Adelaide, Melbourne, Queensland & Europe including the 3MBS Armstead Singing Award & the MIA Operatic Awards. She has undertaken Master Classes with Renata Scotto, Emma Matthews and Mitchel Piper. Sir Zacharia Wentworth— Gerard Fullarton

Gerard began acting as one of the King's children in The King and I when he was in primary school many, many (many) years ago. He was a member of various school choirs before joining the Sacred Heart Cathedral choir in Bendigo, and later the St Patrick's Cathedral Choir in Melbourne. Having done some backstage and minor onstage work (one of the lads in Oliver in 1971) with the Bendigo Operatic Society, Gerard did not do much other stage work until joining DVS in the mid 1990s, thinking he was going to be safe, hiding in the choral side of the group! Since then he has been involved with A Nice Dilemma, The Mikado, the 2000 production of The Merry Widow From Bluegum Creek (Michelin/Njegus), The Sorcerer (Rev Throbbing/ Rev Daly), Merrie England (Big Ben), Gondoliers (Luis), Brigadoon (Mr Lundie) and Iolanthe (Tolloller), all with DVS, and Mikado, Carmen, Trial By Jury, HMS Pinafore and The Merry Widow (Pritschitsch) with Babirra Music Theatre and Iolanthe with the G&S Society.





(aptain Bruce (rompton — Neil Spitzer

Neil Spitzer has been in musical theatre for almost 30 years. He has been involved on stage, backstage and in administration. He has been involved with Diamond Valley Singers for several years, mainly in ensemble. His roles include Joe in *The Pajama Game*, and recently Foreman of the Jury in *Trial By Jury* (30th Anniversary Concert 2015). The role of Crompton is the biggest of his career. Having auditioned unsuccessfully for years with various roles, he now has to do the hard work.



Mrs Olga (rompton — Barbara Skewes

Barb loves to perform, and has featured as leads in *Hairspray*, *Oliver*, *My Fair Lady*, *Chicago* and *Annie*. A life member of DVS, Michael first created the role of Danny back in 2000 for the Victorian premiere of this version. Now he returns to play Michelin, the smartest man on stage, a very rare feat for a tenor! Other roles for DVS have included: Fairfax (Yeomen Of The Guard), Ralph (H.M.S Pinafore), Nanki Poo (Mikado) and Hines (Pajama Game). Michael has also featured as tenor soloist in many oratorios including Messiah, Elijah, Creation and Alexander's Feast. Apart from DVS, Michael has also performed with various other choirs and musical societies in Melbourne, and was a member of the Opera Australia Melbourne Chorus. In 2011, Michael had the wonderful opportunity to perform the roles of Leonard Merryl (Yeomen Of The Guard) and Strephon (The Arcadians) at the International G&S Festival in Buxton, UK.



Viscount Camille de Rosillon – Darren Rosenfeld

Darren has been performing for over twenty years in everything from opera to musical comedy and as a soloist in oratorio works *The Messiah*, *Creation* and *Mozart's Requiem*. In 2011 he appeared in *Yeoman* and the rarely staged show The Arcadians, at the G&S International festival in Buxton, England, Roles include The Duke (*Patience*), Alfredo (*Die Fledermaus*), St Brioche (*The Merry Widow*), Sebastion (*The Sorcerer*), Mendel (*Fiddler on the Roof*), Charlie (*Brigadoon*), Francis Fryer (*Calamity Jane*), Sam (*Mama Mia!*), Dick Walnough (*Boy from Oz*), and Prez (*The Pajama game*). He has written an operetta based on the characters and plots of Gilbert and Sullivan titled *A Nice Dilemma* and is a member of the Savoy Singers and Ashton Smith Singers. Darren is happy to be reprising the role of Camille he did 15 years ago, minus a bit less hair and hopes you enjoy the show.



The Marquis de Cascada — Gary Short

Gary remembers being in the audience for the previous DVS production of *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek*, since that time, he was enticed to move from the audience to be on the stage. He credits Graham Ford for being a major influence with this. Consequently Gary has appeared in the DVS productions of *Kismet, Carousel, Such is Life!*, *A Fine Dilemma, A Funny Thing Happened On The Way to the Forum, Kiss Me Kate, Pajama Game* and *Pirates of Penzance*. Gary is also a founding and central member of the St. Pauls' Players, in Ringwood, a continuing involvement that began in 1997. Having failed French in year 10 (so long ago that it was called 'Form 4') he asks your forgiveness for his obvious reliance on Monty Python and Poirot for the accent his role required.



Monsieur de St. Brioche — Gary O'Dwyer

Gary made his stage debut as Salesman 2 in St. Gabriel's Theatre Group's 2003 production of *The Music Man*. Since then he has performed in productions with a number of companies, including Moreland Theatre Company, Catchment Players & Eltham Little Theatre. Some of his favourite roles have been Thenardier in *Les Miserables* and King Arthur in *Camelot. ABOUT THE DIAMOND VALLEY SINGERS

Diamond Valley Singers started 1985 in response to a desire to raise money for the Freedom From Hunger campaign run by World Vision. Ian Lowe as conductor of the Eltham Orchestra, and asked Graham and Mavis Ford to find a cast to include Gibert and Sullivan's *Trial by Jury* in the program. Not only did they raise a lot of money that year, but the singers liked the idea so much they formed DVS, and this is their 30th year at it. In that time they have raised about \$150 000 for charities, particularly World Vision and Open House. A charity recently added to their list is a small school in Malawi. Carmina Burana

Franz Lehar's, *The Merry Widow*, (1905) is unchallenged as the most popular operetta of the twentieth century, Derived from Henri Meilhac's 1861 comedy. *The Ambassador's Attache*, The operetta's original German libretto was written by Leo Stein and Victor Leon, and some of their realistic love scenes caused a stir. There have been many, english translations and 'versions' since, mostly lightweight and tedious for today's audiences, who wait impatiently for the next song, wondering why Lehar's passionate music has been yoked to such pantomime frolics.

The setting is Paris, but most of the characters come from the invented Balkan kingdom of Pontevedrina. At the Pontevedreinian embassy, we meet the ambassador, his impressionable wife, and various attaches and diplomats, all doing theur best to represent their ancient, unsophisticated, country in highly-cultured 'Gay Paree'.

The notion behind, *The Merry Widow from Bluegum Creek* is simple. It's still turn-of-the-century Paris, but the main characters come from that new, unsophisticated, not-so-mythical country, Australia. As Federation happened in 1901, it seems fair that Australian might have opened its first continental embassy around that time, and, that the Battling Aussie Ambassador and his staff, are fiercely proud of their far-off homeland, and wary of the stuck up Frenchies. That twist accepted, everything falls into place. In fact, the story seems to regain some of its buried life and, most importantly, the passions of the players being to match the glorious, sensual throb of the music.

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
